


Outdoor Yellow Brick Road Trip

<u>Topeka</u>

1. Kaw River State Park

Kaw River is the only urban-type state park. It consists of 76 acres on the south bank of the Kansas River adjacent to MacLennan Park and Cedar Crest (the Kansas Governor's residence) to the east. Hiking and mountain-biking trails wind through an extensive oak-hickory forest on steep slopes with good views.

2. Prairie Spirit Trail*

The Prairie Spirit Trail offers a peaceful and calm tranquility away from the hustle and bustle of big city life. The 51 mile trail is a linear park passing through three counties with eight pocket-parks along the way. It is a greenway and travel corridor open to pedestrians and bicyclists that traverses diverse ecosystems including tallgrass prairie, riparian areas, agricultural lands, and communities. <u>Click here to see a short video clip of the trail.</u>

3. Tallgrass Prairie National Preserve*

Nearly 11,000 acres of wide open space, beautiful vistas, seasonal wildflowers, wildlife, bison herd, and plenty of solitude. The Tallgrass Prairie National Preserve is the only unit in the National Park Service dedicated to preserving a rare remnant of tallgrass prairie. The preserve has over 40 miles of hiking and nature trails.

<u>Marquette</u>

4. Kanopolis State Park

This state park is situated amidst the striking Smoky Hills region of Kansas and is treasured for its 27.38 miles of trails that meander through canyons, prairies, and wooded creek bottoms. The sublime Dakota sandstone bluffs and craggy Horsethief Canyon decorate the park and its surrounding area presenting pristine views of what's considered some of Kansas' most stunning scenery.

Sylvan Grove

5. Wilson State Park

This 945-acre park is tucked away in the center of the Smoky Hills and is well attended for the scenery its location affords. Hiking trails offer unrivaled views of native Kansas prairie and the Wilson Reservoir, which features a rugged shoreline punctuated by scenic cliffs and rocky outcrops.

Over the Smoky Hills of weathered bedrock, the Post Rock Scenic Byway winds through fields, pastures and prairie.



Switchgrass Mountain Bike Trail

Named an "Epic Trail" by the International Mountain Bicycling Association, this single-track mountain bike trail features 22 miles along scenic red sandstone rock formations.

Great Bend

6. Cheyenne Bottoms*

Cheyenne Bottoms is a complex of marshy basins in a 41,000-acre lowland area containing the largest system of wetlands in Kansas and is the richest wetland feeding grounds in the central flyway. Some 320 species of birds frequent Cheyenne Bottoms, including the Bald Eagle, Whooping Crane, Peregrine Falcon, Least Tern and Piping Plover.

This hike/bike trail is about 6 miles long and is along the Arkansas River. Great for wildlife viewing while you exercise.

7. Cedar Bluff State Park

More than 14,000 acres of water and wildlife area make Cedar Bluff State Park an excellent destination for campers, hunters, anglers and year-round explorers. And, they don't call it Cedar Bluff for nothing! For a stunning view of the area, drive to the top of the 150-foot tall, cedar-covered limestone bluffs on the south side of the lake.

See what was deposited at the bottom of a great inland sea that covered most of North America during the later part of the Cretaceous Period, about 80 million years ago.

Smoky Valley Scenic Byway

Named for their hazy, blue appearance at sunrise and sunset, the Smoky Hills divide the more easterly mixed-grass prairie from the shortgrass prairie of the Western Great Plains.

Threshing Machine Canyon

Site of a Native American attack on a wagon train bearing a threshing machine. You will find carvings dating back to the mid-1800s.

Scott City

8. Scott State Park*

Named to National Geographic's list of the country's 50 must-see state parks, this aptly named "stunning oasis" has everything you could want in a park. Spanning 1,020 acres, the natural features include wooded canyons, rugged bluffs and fresh springs. Lake Scott is large enough to accommodate boating and fishing and the extensive trail system allows horseback riding. With more than 26 archeological sites in the area, the remarkable features are more than just aesthetically pleasing.

Monument Rocks*

Punished Woman's Fork/Battle Canyon

Travel to the place where the last Indian battle in Kansas was fought. Rifle pits the Cheyenne strategically positioned are still visible on the hilltops.
